OPENING STATEMENT OF HON. MIKE CRAPO, A U.S. SENATOR
 FROM IDAHO, CHAIRMAN, COMMITTEE ON FINANCE

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The Chairman. The committee will come to order.
We meet today to favorably report the nominations
of Jim O'Neill, who is nominated to serve as Deputy
Secretary of the U.S. Department of Health and Human
Services; and Gary Andres, who is nominated to serve as
the Assistant Secretary for Legislation at HHS.

10 The meeting this morning will provide members with 11 the opportunity to make remarks on the nominees. We 12 will notify members of the time - actually, that time's 13 been agreed to: 11:30 at the first vote.

14 And during this hearing -- let me just go on and say, during his hearing, Mr. O'Neill discussed his plan 15 to work closely with Secretary Kennedy to improve 16 17 America's health-care system. Given his previous 18 service at the Department and depth of management 19 experience in the private sector, he's uniquely 20 qualified to enact positive change at HHS. If confirmed 21 as Deputy Secretary, Mr. O'Neill will have the 22 opportunity to implement reforms in each division of the 23 Department.

As a veteran of Capitol Hill, Mr. Andres knows how to implement successful legislative agendas and will be

a valuable partner to Congress at HHS. I was also
 encouraged to hear Mr. Andres's commitment to
 prioritizing timeliness and responding to questions from
 members.

5 I'll be voting in favor of both nominations, and I 6 encourage all of my colleagues on the committee to do 7 the same.

8 I now recognize Senator Wyden.

OPENING STATEMENT OF HON. RON WYDEN, A U.S. SENATOR FROM
 OREGON

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Senator Wyden. Thank you very much, Mr. Chairman.
Mr. Chairman, let's start with the elephant in the
room: Donald Trump's so-called "big beautiful bill."
This week Republicans in the House unveiled the largest
proposed cut to the Medicaid program in American
history.

10 The bill takes a wrecking ball to Medicaid, making 11 it harder to get health care and loading down the 12 program with a thicket of red tape and bureaucracy. 13 This approach is straight out of the playbook of 14 for-profit insurance companies that Americans are 15 totally and completely fed up with.

Taken together, the bill amounts to a trillion dollars in health-care cuts, and most of it comes from millions of working people and even kids losing their health insurance. It'll also raise premiums for over a million seniors on Medicare.

Now, Republicans say, of course, that they're cutting waste, fraud, and abuse out of the health-care system. But the way this is going forward, that's just code for kicking millions of people off their health insurance. And my view is that this bill is yet another

rationalization to get more tax breaks to the
 ultra-wealthy and multinational corporations.

3 So I asked Mr. O'Neill to give a straightforward 4 "yes" or "no" answer on whether he supports cutting 5 Medicaid during his Finance Committee confirmation 6 hearing. What he did was repeat the same tired talking 7 points about how in effect only certain groups deserve 8 health care.

9 Here are the facts. These cuts to Medicaid are 10 going to hurt kids, seniors, Americans with 11 disabilities, and working families the hardest. Parents 12 are going to get caught in a web of red tape 13 requirements, and their children are going to pay the 14 price.

15 Kids with disabilities are going to see their home 16 care options reduced or cut all together, forcing 17 parents to make agonizing choices about whether they can 18 continue to live at home and get the care they need.

Nursing homes will be less safe, because Republicans are rolling back the requirement that a nurse is always in a nursing home 24/7. And make no mistake about it, in the Senate, where so many of us represent large numbers of rural communities, those communities are going to be devastated.

25 Rural hospitals are going to have to make tough

choices between hiring another nurse or buying that medical device that isn't available anywhere in the county. Everyday Americans are going to pay the price for Trump's bogus agenda of cutting vital programs instead of taking on waste, fraud, and abuse.

6 Mr. O'Neill endorsed that agenda. On top of it, 7 he also endorsed Robert Kennedy's disastrous approach to 8 the ongoing measles outbreak, which has now topped 1,000 9 cases. Worst yet, he appeared to share Robert Kennedy's 10 appalling views about the life prospects of Americans 11 with autism.

I particularly want to condemn this idea of creating a national registry for those with autism. That is a dangerous road to travel down, and parents are scared about what the Trump administration is planning.

Finally, I want to turn to Mr. Gary Andres, who's nominated to serve as the congressional liaison at HHS. Since Donald Trump was inaugurated, his administration has not provided a single meaningful response to dozens of inquiries. Robert Kennedy promised radical transparency, but all the American people have gotten is radical secrecy.

23 Mr. Andre's current position in the House Budget 24 Committee signed off on a Republican wish list of more 25 than \$2 trillion dollars in Medicaid cuts. Many of

1 those cuts have now made it into the bill that is moving 2 through the House at present.

These cuts are going to force rural hospitals, nursing homes, and other essential services to close their doors or turn away patients, leaving millions of people without the health care they need. Americans will die as a result of these cuts.

8 I am not going to support nominees who are going 9 to force American families to walk even more of an 10 economic tightrope without the protection of affordable 11 health care. I urge my colleagues to vote "no."

12 Thank you, Senator Crapo.

13 The Chairman. Thank you, Senator Wyden.
14 Seeing no other Senators here to make a statement,
15 unless there is objection, the committee will recess and
16 reconvene on the floor at 11:30 during the first vote.

Without objection, it is so ordered, and thecommittee stands in recess.
